

Domain Names



In a nutshell, the domain name is the name of the website.
No two domain names can ever be the same.

If your business name is already taken (you can check with any domain provider), you'll have to adapt it slightly.

You can easily do this with some carefully placed punctuation or by using another domain extension. It's important to choose a domain name that represents your business and can grow with you.

Payment

You'll need to pay for all the domain names you hold.

The reality is, you won't ever own a domain name and the payment will be to effectively rent it for the duration of the subscription. The payment can be an ongoing monthly fee but

it's usually an annual or five-year charge.

If the payment lapses either because of incorrect payment details or if an ongoing subscription wasn't set up when the domain name was purchased, you will lose ownership of the domain with very little chance to get it back.

When this happens, your content will be removed. Anyone can then buy the domain name leaving you unable to recover it.

It's therefore critical to business operations that you know who you bought the domain name from. If you don't know, you can find out here (click the link below):

Fast facts: Domain name

- You can't have the same domain name as another website so choose carefully
- Domain payments are ongoing, usually annually. If you don't pay this bill when it's due for renewal, you can potentially lose access to your website

Website Hosting



Website hosting is the online service that allows you to publish your website on the internet.

Host companies rent out space on a server they own to give your website an internet presence.

Hosting is essential for everyone who wants a visible website. Again, payment for this is as a subscription either monthly or annually. Exactly like the domain name, if you don't keep up with the subscription, your website will no longer be published.

If you're still confused between domains and hosting, look at it in simpler terms.

You have a lamp (domain) in your home, but you also need an electricity account (host) to switch the light on and for it to function.

This is no different.

You can have one without the other, but the two need to integrate to function correctly.

Not all hosting packages are created equal. The higher functionality and bigger the website, the more hosting space and capacity you'll need. Costs for hosting can vary.

Dates For Your Diary



Hosting and domain registration are ongoing businesses expenses like any other subscription.

The cost will be similar from year to year, but if you choose to pay yearly or five yearly, it's an easy cost to miss. Especially if your web developer paid for the subscription when they built the site and have overlooked the annual reminder.

While the hosting and domain companies will send a renewal, this can be sent to whoever built the website. Because of the setup process, it's not unusual for these reminders to get missed. Once an attempt has been made to contact you, the service will then be switched off.


Create a calendar reminder in your payment system when subscriptions are due to expire. This will make sure you never forget to renew and have the option to shop around making

sure you're always getting the best value and most efficient service.

When you sign up for hosting, you'll have another username and password to log into the interface.

If you haven't got this or don't know where to find it, contact the web developer today and get this information to keep somewhere safe.

In this interface, you'll find account and billing information as well as a section called cPanel.

cPanel is control panel software and provides all the tools you need to manage your website, create new email addresses and back up the site.

Backing up through CPanel


A web developer can manage a website back up, but we recommend that every website owner at least understands the process.

This comprehension will avoid you becoming vulnerable to losing valuable data caused by a breakdown in a relationship or if the web developer company ceases operations.

In the cPanel, you can make a full copy of all files, emails, and any databases attached to the website.

You don't need to know how to do this yourself, but if you lose your files you need to understand that this is where a backup may be.

While you won't be able to restore the website from the cPanel backup, a zipped copy of your files will be available.



Fast facts: cPanel

- You can't restore your website from the cPanel but you can backup files there
- Performing regular backups means the files will be accessible for a web developer to restore the website.
- You will have a separate username and password to login to the cPanel interface for your website host, if you don't have this, get it!

Email Backups



We recommend backing up to a USB device or a cloud-based software such as DropBox, Microsoft One or iCloud.

In the cPanel, you can set up email addresses that can be accessed via an email server such as Outlook or Gmail. If your email server is cloud-based, you'll be able to access them anywhere.

If they're stored locally, you must back up regularly to avoid losing access to important information.

Step by step back up from Outlook:

Select File > Open & Export > Import/Export.

Select Export to a file, and then select Next.

Select Outlook Data File (.pst), and select Next.

Select the mail folder you want to back up and select Next.

Choose a location and name for your backup file, and then select Finish.

You can choose where you want the backup to be located but beware of storing locally. If you lose access to the PC or laptop, you'll lose access to the emails too.
